We also recognize the dual mandate of the National Park Service to preserve and protect natural resources while allowing for the enjoyment of the general public.

We are writing to express our concerns regarding the operation of Grand Teton National Park during the Covid-19 pandemic that has led to a declaration of National Emergency.

As you may know, Teton County and the Town of Jackson have implemented aggressive measures to reduce the rates of infection in our county. We have mandated the closure of many non-essential businesses and limited the size of gatherings through a public health order issued by Dr. Travis Riddell, our County Public Health Officer.

We have taken these steps in order to reduce the peak demand for critical health care services, and to attempt to keep that demand in line with our treatment capacity. While our hospital is as prepared as possible, it has a limited capacity to treat residents of our county, and a large and sudden increase in the number of patients needing critical care services could overwhelm its capacity and our ability to treat everyone in need.

We are particularly concerned that an influx of visitors will increase that peak demand for critical health care, and that we will not have the capacity to treat those visitors.


